

Puppy Mills

What is a Puppy Mill?

- A commercial breeding facility that mass-produces many breeds of puppies solely for profit, with no regard given to the social, physical, or emotional welfare of the breeding dogs. Mostly operating in rural areas, no accurate statistics are available regarding how many puppy mills exist in Ontario.

What happens to these dogs?

- Adult breeding dogs are subjected to immeasurable cruelty, forced to breed at every heat cycle, existing their entire lives in cramped wire cages.
- They are often kept in cold, dark conditions or hot, unventilated conditions with no opportunity to develop normally or healthily.
- Many cannot fully stand or walk due to a lifetime of confinement.
- Many are infected with parasites such as mange and other infectious diseases, which are often passed onto their pups.
- They rarely, if ever, receive veterinary care.
- When the breeding dogs' fertility wanes, they are routinely killed, or abandoned. Some lucky ones are sold to rescue groups.
- They never receive any human social interaction.
- All of the above can result in genetic, physical and behavioural problems in their offspring.

Where can I find a Canine Companion?

- Do not mistakenly believe that you must go to a breeder in order to get a purebred, or a 'good' dog. An estimated 25% of shelter and/or rescue dogs are purebred, who end up there for a variety of reasons. You can also contact breed specific rescues if you have a specific breed in mind.
- Choose your source very carefully. Seek advice from local rescue organizations. For a list of rescues in your area: Canadaguidetodogs.com/rescue.htm is an excellent starting point.
- Not all rescue organizations are created equal. Do your homework and research the rescue group of your choice. Call your local Humane Society and/or other local rescue organizations for reference checks.
- Finding the right canine companion takes time and effort. By researching the many shelters/rescue groups, you can help put an end to the inhumane cruelty that currently exists in the puppy mill industry that places profit and greed above animal welfare.
